There was so much hustle and bustle in Rhiwbina during the weeks leading up to Christmas; everyone seemed busy, too busy to stop and listen. *"What is this life if, full of care, we have no time to stand and stare"*... W.H. Davies

And do we fall into this trap, where we have no time to *really* stop and listen? Of course, Christmas is a wonderful time when we all look forward to the birth of Jesus, but what about those who, though not homeless, may be on their own - lonely. Someone said recently that one can be very lonely in a room full of people. And what about those who cannot break the barrier of loneliness, who find it difficult to actually go out and speak to anyone each day? Over the years it has been our observation that the world is full of sadness, hidden alongside the euphoria of others' happiness.

Of course Beulah does reach out to its community; on Christmas Day this year members fed, entertained and shared friendship with 37 people who would have otherwise spent the day alone, somewhere in Cardiff; this fellowship has been taking place for 47 years, started by the then Youth Fellowship.

Weekly Youth Drop-ins, Paradise Runs for the homeless, and monthly Music Concerts are all welcomed by the local community, as is free access to Beulah's peaceful community garden, and the Margaret Whittaker Lounge where people come to enjoy the quiet, friendship and warmth.

It has been said to us more than once, both in Rhiwbina Civic Society and in Monico Movies, that people value being part of local community events that they can walk to safely and join with people they know, who make them feel valued and welcome. We are a caring church but as someone said in our transitional conversations earlier this year "beware the friendly church - if you are not in a friendly group, you can feel isolated"; this can apply in or outside of any church of course.

Psalm 25 v.16 says "Turn to me and be gracious to me, for I am lonely and afflicted". We all decided during our Transitional Ministry conversations that we should do more to take church outside to the community. So could we all do more, not only at Christmas but all year round?

# CHURCH NOTES

Christmas and New Year have come and gone, and we marked the occasions in many and varied ways. Thanks also to those involved with the production of the Advent Writings booklets which provided us with some thoughtful and inspiring reflections.

The theme for Advent was 'Conversations' and this was cleverly reflected in the evolving art work on Canolfan wall, created by Jo Jones. The intention was to encourage people to talk about what they saw, and think more deeply about the coming of Christ into the world.

Further opportunities in 2019 to continue and develop such conversations will be found through the focus of the new theme, which you may know by now is, 'Flowing streams, bringing life.'; in our Lent Study sessions when we will come together with

other URCs in Cardiff; in conversations around the book of Colossians during Bible Month which Vera is organising for us, and on retreat in Caldey. Each Wednesday at 10.30am, at Meeting Point, a small group gathers in the church to discuss, reflect and pray – a wonderful opportunity for conversations to develop in all kinds of ways. A warm welcome is extended to anyone to pop in and join them. We have also been invited to conversations ecumenically by the Revd. Phil Dunning, who is organising a 'Why?' course at Bethany and would be pleased to welcome anyone who is interested in joining these discussions. Perhaps we could find time as well to think about our conversations with God and how we pray, in church together, or when alone. Conversations are also at the heart of our Pastoral work – sitting alongside those who are going through difficult times, listening to what they say and sharing with them is a great privilege, even when we are not sure what the 'right' thing to say might be! Like many, I have been greatly helped by the support of friends and

elders in Beulah when we have walked through darker times, deeply grateful for acts of kindness and words of encouragement. There are no 'qualifications' in church for pastoral work, but we all get better at it by doing it, and not being afraid to reach out. The listening part of such conversations is perhaps the most important, and some of these conversations may not need many words.

## 'Things I would like to know'

**C**ommunication was identified as one of our priorities during the consultation stage of the Transitional Ministry process. A group was set up in September 2017 to explore this theme and identify areas to improve or innovate. This group reported back to Elders and Church Meeting in the latter part of 2018, and a number of their recommendations were approved to take further. A refreshed Communications group was then set up to look in more detail at our communications and to find ways of implementing recommendations. One suggestion that has come out the early meetings of this group is to set up a 'Things I would like to know' column in Crossroads (based on the 'What Now?' page of the Consultations booklet.) Exactly how to manage it is still being explored, but we thought we would begin by addressing the first of the questions that are quoted in the booklet:

### ***What is Synod?***

The URC is '*a family of Christians, worshipping in the name of Jesus in about 1500 local churches from Orkney to Cornwall.*'

The basic structure of the URC consists of 3 councils: the local Church  
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(and Elders') Meetings; the regional Synods and General Assembly. (plus Mission Council)

The URC web site explains that the Synods are regional administrative groupings of churches that administer churches at a regional level, and have oversight from a Synod Moderator.

There are 13 Synods in the United Reformed Church. Wales comprises one of these, as does Scotland, with the remaining being regions of England.

The United Reformed Church in Wales is made up of 91 local congregations, half of whom are in Local Ecumenical partnerships. All these churches belong to the National Synod of Wales which carries out its work through a variety of councils and boards, which recently underwent restructuring.

Beulah is now served by the Cardiff and Penarth Regional Pastoral Committee, with our representative being Derek Evans.

The Synod Meeting takes place twice a year to which each church is invited to send a representative.

Much of the Synod's work is carried out and coordinated by the Synod Pastoral Committee Meeting, together with others, including the Mission & Discipleship Board and the Finance and Property Board. The Synod is also served by a number of staff officers: the Synod Moderator, Synod Clerk, Synod Treasurer, two Training and Development Officers, an Ecumenical Officer, Children and Youth Development Officer (CYDO) and a Property Officer.

The current Moderator of the Synod of Wales is the Reverend Simon Walkling.

You will remember that we tried to address this question by inviting the Synod Clerk, the Reverend Adrian Bulley to the February Church Meeting last year. Adrian gave a very full and comprehensive explanation of the structure of the URC, especially explaining the new structure in Wales. We appreciate that not all were able to attend - copies of the presentation are available, so if you would like one, please see Louise. Over the years members of Beulah have contributed to the work of the Synod in many ways, including holding offices such as Synod Clerk and Treasurer. Colin Grimes, and Richard and Sarah Edwards currently hold responsibilities within the Synod.

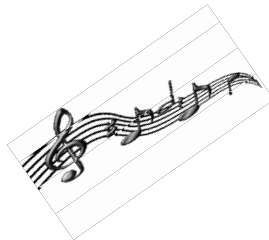

## Three Mountains to Freedom

### - Lent reflections with URC churches in Cardiff

Come along to get to know people from other churches and your own, in a friendly, informal atmosphere. Come to explore ideas about living Christian faith in Cardiff. Come for all five or for just one session...

Our sessions will draw on the book *'Three Mountains to Freedom'*, by John Dudley Davies, which takes a practical look at some themes in St Paul's letter to the Galatians.

We will meet on Wednesday evenings from 7.30 to 9 pm. Here is a broad itinerary:

**Wednesday 13th March, Beulah URC      The Foothills      Galatians 1: 1 – 24.**

What type of church are we, and what is our story? What is the relationship between churches which are upholders of tradition and those on the edge, pushing boundaries?

**Wednesday 20th March, City URC      Mount Faith      Galatians 2: 1 – 21.**

Where does cultural tradition divide us or become a barrier to faith? Faith in what?

**Wednesday 27th March, Beulah URC      Mount Unity      Galatians 3: 26 – 4:7.**

How inclusive is our church? Who's 'in' and who's 'out'? What would be needed for our nation to be truly One Nation?

**Wednesday 3rd April, City URC      Mount Freedom      Galatians 5.: 1- 15.**

What does it mean to be free in Christ? Is Christ enough?

**Wednesday 10th April, Beulah URC      Back on level ground      Galatians 5:16 – 6:10.**

Living in the Spirit. What messages do we have to share with our church, and our community? What lies ahead for our own pilgrimage?

You are encouraged, if you wish, to get and read a copy of the book beforehand, although this is not essential. You are also encouraged to read through the letter to the Galatians and to bring a Bible to the session.

There will be a follow up meeting on Wednesday 8th May at City URC to discuss the continuation of the group, perhaps on a monthly basis and hosted by whichever churches wish to participate.

## ***Exploring Islam through conversation***

*As many of you know I'm in the process of training to become a Methodist local preacher. As part of the course we are encouraged to find out more about another world faith; I chose Islam.*

In the UK Muslims are the second largest religious group, making up just under 5% of the population<sup>1</sup>. After reading a few books I realised what I really wanted was conversation – to discuss faith with a Muslim woman. So I invited a colleague at work to meet over lunch.

I was very nervous. I'd read a book on Christian/Islamic interfaith engagement- on what not to say to avoid causing offence. But I needn't have worried – she was very welcoming, it was great to talk to someone who believes faith matters.

Some of our most interesting conversations were about prayer and studying the Qur'an/Bible - both what we do and why. As a devout Muslim she prays 5 times a day to a strict timetable which often means setting an alarm clock to wake up before dawn. The prayer is in Arabic, not her first language, and both the words of the prayer and the actions accompanying them are fixed. Only after reciting the prescribed prayer can she bring her concerns to God. We worked out she spends over 30 minutes saying the set prayers each day.

Her level of commitment challenges me. It is easy to repeat well known prayers without thinking about what we are saying. But what would it be like to make meaningful space for a short prayer five times throughout the day. Beginning with a prayer of adoration focusing on who God is, as Muslims do, before listing our individual concerns, helps us see the wider picture. It's a pattern of worship embedded in many of the psalms combining honesty with statements of trust in the love and power of God.

Talking to her makes me very grateful that I can study the Bible in my own language and have easy access to commentaries. I spend more time studying the Bible than she does the Qur'an; but she spends more in prayer.

We discovered shared experiences of people coming together to pray for others. I told her about the atmosphere in a church praying for their minister when her Dad was seriously ill. She spoke of women coming together to pray in silence for people they care about.

Yet there are major differences. I wondered what motivated her to pray five times a day. She explained that for her time on earth is like the 'blink of an eye'. What mattered was life after death – and what happened then depended on how you behaved on earth. If individual prayer goes unanswered you are building up rewards in heaven and will be better off when you die. Judgement is very real – and one of the main reasons for Muslims gathering to pray for others is to pray for the souls of those who had died that they will be spared punishment.

It was difficult for me to reconcile this fear with her description of the love of God she experienced whilst on Hajj (pilgrimage to Mecca). All devout Muslims are expected to go on Hajj once in their lifetime – it is an expensive journey. Women must be accompanied by a male escort such as her husband or close family members (generally someone she cannot marry). However no male escort is needed for a group of four or more women over 45. So when my colleague's brother announced he was going her husband said –'you go, you may not get another chance'. She left her young family and went to Mecca for a month. I was impressed with this decision – it goes

against common stereotypes about women taking the second place to men in Islam.

On her return she started to wear the hijab (headscarf), something she had not had the confidence to do before. She said she had not experienced prejudice at work or harassment but is aware she needs to be careful at times of increased hostility to Muslims.

I was staggered when she revealed she doesn't go to Mosque. In the UK 28% of Mosques have no facilities for women<sup>2</sup>. Communal worship is so important to me that I cannot comprehend what it would be like to rely on what my mother taught me and books/TV programmes/websites to find out more about my faith.

Last November I visited Dar Ul-Isra Mosque as part of Interfaith week 2018 and asked a male leader about worship and facilities for women. They have separate places for women to worship – and indeed the women's toilets/washroom was behind a door labelled 'Sisters only' which led to backstairs and a back entrance. His view was that some Mosques don't have space for women – men are required to attend and so have priority. But he recognised that some Mosques may use this as an excuse to exclude women. For him women need to learn about Islam so they can teach children; I wondered what opportunities there were for women to worship without children.

Worship for my Muslim colleague involves all her life – how she treats people, what she does, what she thinks is right. It echoed a sound clip I'd heard on my car radio earlier in the week for a Radio 4 series presented by Baroness Sayeeda Warsi. In the clip poet Suhaiymah Manzoor-Khan says that 'My version of me is one that does not have to separate God from my life. I exist to worship God'. Like many Christians Manzoor-Khan's faith is the motivation behind her social action. In the series Sayeeda Warsi interviews seven Muslim women about their faith, including a young Pakistani woman who found faith while training in the army. <https://www.bbc.co.uk/programmes/p06rvdbh/episodes/downloads>
