Dear Friends,

October 2019

When we moved to the Wirral, there are many things we had to learn. Obviously, we had to learn our way around—which became clear as we walked the wrong way home from the town centre with bags and our daughter, Hannah, in her pushchair. Some times we had to learn the meaning of a word we didn't understand. Sometimes we deciphered a cultural reference that we could not know given we had been raised in a different culture. In this process of discovery one of the phrase we learned, "Are you sitting comfortably, then I'll begin."

We are not sure we are all sitting comfortably, though the manse is much more comfortable than it was when Martha arrived! But we have begun. We have begun our new ministry together.

It has been a very different way to begin for all of us. In some ways it may seem strange because you have new ministers, but you may have only seen us a couple of times, if at all. It seems strange to us too as we are having to get to know six different communities and churches. Yet we have begun.

Beginnings are always exciting. There is potential and hope. There are new ideas and stories to share. There is history to learn. It is a good time. We are developing relationships and are open to the ways God may work with us and through us.

In this new time, please feel free to let us know about events you think we might find interesting to attend. Please ask us to join in, stop us to tell us a story, or invite us to meet with you. If we cannot participate at that moment, we will find another time to be present, to share time, to listen.

Journalist, Malcolm Gladwell, says, "The visionary starts with a clean sheet of paper, and re-imagines the world." Though each congregation has been working and serving God for years, in a sense we are starting with a clean sheet of paper, not to wipe out the past, but to reimagine how God may work through us.

When Jesus invited the disciples to follow him, St. Mark says they got up immediately and joined him. We are not thinking that lots of things will happen immediately, but we are hopeful that together our lives will reflect God's love and deepen our discipleship.

Walking in the Footsteps of Mary Jones

'Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light for my path.' (Psalm 119:105)

I am sure that most of you will know the story of Mary Jones, the young girl who walked, barefoot, from her home at the foot of Cadair Idris to Bala to buy a copy of the newly translated Welsh bible from Thomas Charles. It was a journey of about 28 miles.

Ann Sheldon (nee Sunderland) was very taken with this story, which she probably first heard in Beulah Sunday School in the 1960s. When she learned about the marking out of this walk in 2000 to commemorate the bicentenary of Marv's achievement, 'doing Mary Jones' became one of her aims. At a get together in the summer of 2009, Ann suggested that we should do the walk 'next year'. ('We' being a small group of old Beulah friends who had been through Sunday School and Youth Fellowship together, plus two spouses.) Sadly, for Ann, this was an ambition never to be realised. Already being treated for cancer, Ann died a few months later in November 2009 at the age of 53.

The rest of us were determined that one day we would 'do Mary Jones', but for one reason or another, it never quite happened. Finally, a few months ago it was decided that 2019, the year that marks the 10th anniversary of Ann's death, would be the year! All but one of us are now retired with the time to devote a week to this challenge, which we will undertake in October, over 4 or 5 days.

We are doing this walk primarily as a challenge for ourselves, but there are other things too - to remember the dedication and faith of Mary herself who had saved for several years to acquire her Bible, and how that inspired Thomas Charles and others to set up the British and Foreign Bible Society (now the Bible Society) with the aim of enabling every Christian to read the Bible in their own language - something we perhaps take for granted. The fellowship that we will share will also keep alive the memory of our friend, and the inspiration that Ann was to so many, in her friendships, her work, her church life and finally as an ordained Minister of Word and Sacraments - which she did for all too short a time.

Finally, we would like to use this walk as an opportunity to raise some money - for the Bible Society, but also for Cancer Research, in memory of Ann. Beulah was the church that formed her, and the church in Hereford that two of our group now attend was also her sending church, so it seems appropriate that we ask members of these two URC fellowships if they would be willing to contribute to these two causes. We have also recently discovered the coincidence that Martha McInnes, our new Minister to the Cardiff Pastorate, was minister at Sutton Coldfield immediately before Ann.

As I try to get fit enough to do this walk, tramping up the steepest sections of Coed y Wenallt and Caerphilly Mountain at odd times of day, it feels as though it is, perhaps, a somewhat over-literal interpretation of 'walking the way', but one that is worth attempting, and I hope will be rewarding in ways other than aching legs and sore feet!

Divestment Resolution at the Synod of Wales Meeting in October

Most of you will know by now that Beulah voted at the Church Meeting in June to end our investments in fossil fuels. Bright Now is the divestment campaign run by Operation Noah, and you can see an article about our divestment in their blog on the following link:

As well as taking the decision to divest from fossil fuels, Beulah also voted to urge the National Synod of Wales to do likewise.

As a result, the following resolution will be debated at the Synod Meeting in Llandrindod Wells on Saturday, 19th October.

"The National Synod of Wales requests the URC (Wales) Trust **Company Limited to amend its** portfolio the earliest at opportunity in order to divest from fossil fuels. and encourages other churches within the Synod to do likewise."

I will be presenting the resolution at the Synod meeting and the Eco Group will be preparing the presentation over the next few weeks. The Supporting Statement, adjacent, has already been submitted by Beulah.

Supporting Statement on Divestment for National Synod of Wales

The ethics of investment in fossil fuels

The climate crisis is an issue of the Fund will become 'fossil free' no utmost urgency, with increasingly severe impacts on our brothers and sisters around the world.

Churches have a duty to ensure that their investments do not compromise the ethical position of their institutions.

In 2018 Christian Aid stated: 'Continuing to profit from fossil fuel production is ... morally wrong; investing in the alternatives is the Churches' prophetic responsibility.'[1]

The impact of fossil fuel divestment

Over 1.100 institutions with more than \$11 trillion (£9 trillion) of assets under management have committed to divest from fossil In conclusion, now is the time fuels.

The United Reformed Church, the Synods URC Scotland. of Yorkshire and Wessex and several local churches have made divestment commitments.

The resolution passed unanimously at URC Mission Council in May 2019 'encourage[s] URC synods and local URC churches with investments to divest from fossil fuels, and reinvest in clean alternatives'. [2]

The financial case for divestment

Climate change poses risks to the entire global economy, threatens assets in the Churches' portfolios and could lead to an 'uninsurable' world. [3]

Oil and gas companies, and those who invest in them, risk being left business-48853217 with worthless fuel reserves, which cannot be burned if we are to meet the Paris Agreement targets.

CCLA recently announced that its **COIF** Charities Ethical Investment later than 1st December 2019. [4]

Engagement with fossil fuel companies

Several Churches have chosen a policy of engagement with oil and gas companies.

Yet companies such as BP and Shell are still pursuing business strategies that would lead to 3-5°C global warming. As well as the URC, the National Trust decided to divest in 2019, citing lack of progress in response to engagement. [5]

None of the major oil and gas companies are aligned with the Paris climate goals. [6]
