t the end of September this year, and the beginning of October last year, the seniors department were missing from the church building for a week. This year, we took the juniors with us too. We were, in fact, doing church differently, we were on the Wenallt. Forest Church exists around the world in various forms, mainly for adults and seems to be run very much like 'church' as we know it...but outside, with prayer walks, meditation, bible study etc..

Our 'Forest Church' came about because Fleur, one of

our leaders, is involved with a project called 'forest school'. This has been developed within primary schools because it is important for all of us, children and adults, to spend time outdoors. Not all children get outside as much as they need to, so forest school helps. The children really enjoy it, especially when it rains! While they are having fun, they are also developing resilience and learning to keep trying in order to achieve (e.g. lighting a fire); this boosts their confidence and self-esteem while gaining a deeper love and concern for nature. Our 'Forest Church' is held at the beginning of the new school year and gives us the opportunity to meet our friends again and to get to ....cont p.2

know the newer members of our group.

The first thing we had to do this year was to build a shelter quickly, because it was raining. We used a tarpaulin and some long sticks and lots of string around the trees. Last year, we were able to spend time finding more natural materials to build shelters because the weather was warm and sunny. Once the shelter was up. Fleur got the fire started. We had to be patient while the fire was getting going. Fire lighting can be easier or harder depending on what you use: the minimum requirement is flint and steel; you can also use dry leaves, paper and matches.

Once the fire was going we were able to feel a bit warmer and drier. We were also able to 'cook'. We made bread twists by winding a strip of dough around a pointed stick and cooking it slowly over the fire. There was only a small amount of dough, but it was enough for us all to have some bread. We also made 'Smores' which are made from a marshmallow that has been over the fire, sandwiched between two chocolate biscuits..YUM While it was raining, we needed to build up morale, so Joe, Owen and Simon taught the others some jamboree songs including: 'My name is Joe', 'singing in the rain' and 'the quarter masters stores'. Our session this year

finished down at the stream where we tried to sail rafts that we had built earlier. paddled in our wellies and collected some water to contribute to the collection for Martha and David's ordination. At the stream, we spent some time describing what different areas of the stream felt like - the fastflowing water, the slower water and particularly the muddy banks! We found some great words to describe these including: sludgy, squishy, slimy, slushy, smelly and sticky. These are illustrated in our picture which can also be viewed in colour along with some photos of the day online at www.beulahurc.org. uk/forestchurch.htm Our morning finished as the sun came out and we were able to have a go on the tree swing over the stream. When forest church comes around next year, we would like to try an orienteering trail as well as some of our favourites: den building; cooking; fire lighting and the

The mingling of the waters from the different churches was a moving part of the service, and we pray that it represents the beginning of an exciting and fruitful time in our churches. We are just at the beginning of this new venture with Martha and David. and we all have a lot to learn about, and from, each other in the coming months. There will be many opportunities to do this, including in the Stepwise 'taster sessions' which they and Stephen are arranging for us - more details on page 5. They are arranged in different venues at different times of day, so hopefully there will be a time to suit everyone!

Some of you have been attending the monthly Cardiff & Penarth Churches' monthly discussion group this is another opportunity to share with members of other congregations and learn and grow together. We would encourage more to come along to these sessions. but if you are not able to attend evening sessions, Sarah Edwards is running a monthly 'Holy Habits' Bible Study at 9.00am on Sunday mornings in Canolfan which is aimed at all ages. One of the areas identified in our transitional work was the need for more opportunities to explore and learn more about our faith so we hope that joining one or other of these groups (and there is no commitment to attend them all!) is a way of meeting that need as we look to grow individually and together in deepening our faith and finding new ways of being disciples of Christ.

A further theme that emerged from the Transitional work was 'Doing well, doing better' – which included a recognition that our current organisational structure was maybe no longer suited to the times we are now in. Elders' and Church Meetings recommended that new ideas should be explored not least because we have been having increasing difficulty in filling elder vacancies. If this is not addressed, the concerns raised during transition that too much is being place on the shoulders of a few will be even more the case. Proposals about how we might do things differently will be put before the Church Meeting on November 24th (please note change of date). Further information will be available in advance. but we would urge as many of you as possible to attend this meeting as this involves a significant decision in the life of the church.



#### What does it mean to be a church "member"?

In our tradition church membership has historically been an important part of an individual's faith journey. Many people will remember making a commitment to a local church as a teenager, wanting to affirm the faith they were exposed to through their childhood.

Today church membership may have a different meaning. Practically, it means those who commit to "membership" have the right to vote in the church meeting and are eligible to serve as an elder, Membership, however, is more than an individual affirmation of faith or a matter of voting or serving on

the eldership. Church membership is about belonging. Where do we find a place to connect with other people and with God? Where do we commit ourselves to serve God and love our neighbours? Where do we connect so that we can grow in faith? Where do we find our spiritual family?

We live times in which some people seek to create division. Yet human beings are created for connections. The church is one place we can find connections, where we can work to overcome barriers, where we can join with others on a journey of discovery—learning

about ourselves and God.

What does it mean to be a church member? It means joining a community, a spiritual family, on a journey. It means committing ourselves to overcome barriers and find connections to other people and to God.



#### Walking in the footsteps of Mary Jones

This walk was done by a group of friends of Ann Sheldon, most of whom grew up in Beulah, in memory of her and as a tribute to her desire to undertake this walk which she was not able to do.



The map shows the route of approximately 28 miles from Mary Jones's home at Llanfihangel-y-Pennant to Bala, which we did over four days in October. The walk took us across stunning countryside, up and down hills, along valleys, past lakes, across pasture land, through old woodland and modern forestry. along quiet lanes and steep narrow sheep tracks, over ancient wooden bridges, stiles and walls, and through many streams – not to mention much mud! The views were magnificent and the weather kind, making every step a delight.

We walked along paths that we would never normally see, and enjoyed hours of friendship and fellowship together in lots of ways. We were struck by the friendliness of the very few people we met along the way – the farmer who waved us through his flock of sheep, the minister who jumped out or his car to take our photograph, and the custodian in the Mary Jones World exhibition centre who showed such an interest in our story – and even posted a photograph of us on the centre's Twitter feed!

There was much laughter and cheerfulness as we let go of the cares and worries of home for a little while, and huge satisfaction (and relief!) as we reached the end of each day. There were some tears too, for Ann, but know she would have been proud of us – especially when we stood near the farm house where the composer of the hymn tune 'Hyfrydol' had lived, and gave our humble rendering of 'Love Divine'. (Fortunately, with only a few sheep and cows near enough to hear!) We took heart from the beauty and glories of God's creation, watching the colours of mountains and trees changing with the light and the advancing of autumn.

The walk is supported by the Bible Society and people come from all over the world to remember the young girl who made this journey (barefoot) in one day to buy a bible of her own to read from Thomas Charles. Her faith and inspiration, I am sure, helped us to keep going when the going got a little tougher. If you are ever in the area, we would recommend visiting the Mary Jones World on the shore of Llyn Tegid (Bala Lake), and if you can, try a section of the walk – or even the whole thing. There are information boards at strategic points along the

way, each of which has an appropriate scripture verse these too provided helpful focus on the way. They include 'Direct my footsteps according to your word.' (Psalm 119:133); 'I will lift up my eyes to the hills.' (Ps 121:11); 'Before the mountains were born.... from everlasting to everlasting, you are God.' (Ps. 90:2); 'How clearly the skies reflect God's glory.' (PS 19.1); 'The mountains and hills will burst into singing and the trees will shout for joy. (Isaiah 55.12) and 'Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light for my path.' (Ps. 105). This final verse reminds us

of the inspiration of Thomas Charles and others to found what is now the Bible Society which still works around the world to provide translations of the Bible in the languages of all those who need it. It has been claimed that this work has ensured the survival of many languages which might otherwise have died out. We therefore decided to raise money to donate to the Bible Society, and also for Cancer Research, in memory of Ann. We would like to thank all who contributed to the retiring collection which will enable us to donate just over £100 to each organisation.

#### PRESS RELEASE: United Reformed Church Synod of Wales divests from fossil fuels


The United Reformed Church Synod of Wales has decided to end investments in fossil fuel companies made on its behalf. A Synod meeting on Saturday 19 October passed a resolution on divestment that had been proposed by members of Beulah United Reformed Church in Cardiff.

The United Reformed Church Synod of Wales becomes the first Church to make this decision across Wales. Their decision to divest reflects the growing public concern about the climate crisis and the Church's responsibility to care for creation. They hope that their decision will contribute to the pressure for urgent change.

Revd Simon Walkling,

Moderator of United Reformed Church Synod of Wales, said: 'We have decided to divest from fossil fuels in response to the growing climate crisis. This is part of the Church's desire to respond to the climate emergency and act for the future of our children and grandchildren, as well as the many people around the world who are already experiencing the devastating impacts of climate change.'

James Buchanan, who works for Christian climate charity Operation Noah on the Bright Now divestment campaign, said: 'We are delighted that the United Reformed Church Synod of Wales has taken this step, and we hope that many other churches across Wales will join them. We urge all investors concerned about the climate crisis to get out of the problem and into the solution by divesting from fossil fuels and increasing investments in the clean technologies of the future.'
