Will we remember where we were when we heard that life was shutting down for a few months; or our daily walks, our food delivery, queuing outside the grocery stores? And what will we remember about June 2020? Will the video of George Floyd haunt us or change us? Will the Anti-Racism railies change us or will they be a memory of "strange times?" Will we remember Nicole Smallman and Bibaa Henry not because MET officers photographed their lifeless bodies but for the joy and love they brought into the world?

openness to dismantling personal and institutional racism will fade and we will accept the way we have always lived tolerating racism; losing the growing awareness of how we have built power and wealth on the backs of enslaved people; ignoring the interest in history being told from different perspectives, not just the perspective of the "winner".

We have always thought of ourselves as fairly open and aware people, but the horror at once again watching the death of a black man in the hands of the police has changed us. Sadly, we have seen it over many years but something about George Floyd has touched us in a different So we have been reading and watching videos. We have been listening to podcasts and been learning. We are learning about history and learning about institutional racism. We are interest in both the history in the USA and in the UK; sadly, there are many links in these histories and parallels in policies.

It would be less painful to learn all this if we thought that this was the past. It is not. The COVID 19 pandemic highlights the vulnerability of Black and Asian minorities to the virus, here and around the world. Nestle withdrawing from using Fair-trade chocolate will have a negative impact on Black people. Climate change has the greatest impact on poor people who are Black and Asian. The list goes on.

Some churches in the US have adopted this sign, "Jesus was a person of colour, murdered by state sanctioned violence." Continuing to follow Jesus faithfully means thinking about this statement. follow him, we must find ways to support people like him—those who are labelled, mistreated, isolated and even murdered because of the colours of their skin. Following Jesus, means unpacking our own prejudices, for we all have them, learning our histories, and finding ways to work for change, to create systems that are more fair, to speak against racism when we encounter it. It is hard work. It is long work. It is work we can only do together. To that end we are having conversations about the resources we are discovering and how we respond. The next meeting is 14 July at 7 p.m. If you would like to participate, send Martha an email to ask for the Zoom link. But even if you don't want to participate in the discussions, there is lots to read and watch to learn and grow your understandings. Martha has put together a list of resources, but anyone can search the internet for books and programmes which are helpful.

We hope we will look back on June/July 2020 and see it as a turning point for us in a journey with racism. We pray we will look back on it and say it was the stage at which we actively became God's people working against racism. We hope and pray we will stand with Jesus, seeking justice for those who have marginalised because of the colour of their skin. We trust God will guide us in this work together.



Energy and Heating Replacement Feasibility Study on the Canolfan: an update from the Eco Group

Concluding his sermon on Sunday 21st June, David encouraged us to take the opportunity "to reassess life as we've known it ... and to reflect in this time of lockdown on what it means to be a follower of Jesus."

Christian Aid had planned to use the theme of climate action throughout 2020 to galvanise support and energy around the case for climate justice. Dr Rowan Williams said, "Christian Aid has worked for seventy-five years alongside communities living in poverty. The greatest driver of poverty in the immediate future is the impact of the climate crisis."

The climate emergency requires that we use less energy as well as better energy sources. Eco Church encourages local churches to monitor, manage and reduce their energy consumption and to put in place year-on-year targets for improvements. As followers of Jesus, we must take urgent and decisive action.

You may have noticed in last month's Church Notes that the Elders had recently agreed a recommendation put forward by the Eco Group. Some of you may also remember that replacement of the boiler in

econgregation

the Canolfan was discussed at the Church Meeting on Sunday 15th December. The Eco Group felt that the need for a new boiler was a problem but also an opportunity, and was a catalyst for action. By installing solar panels, switching to greener energy sources and taking the divestment decision last year, Beulah's membership had already expressed a firm commitment to move away from the use of fossil fuels. Improving the thermal performance of the Canolfan (e.g. by insulating the building better) would reduce the energy use and influence our choice of heating replacement. The group concluded that we needed detailed building-specific advise to assess the options, costs and potential savings to finance and to our carbon footprint. A successful consequent project would improve thermal comfort in the Canolfan, benefiting all of our users, and would act as a beacon to others as a practical response to the climate emergency taken by Beulah.



The Eco Group therefore proposed the commissioning of an Energy and Heating Replacement Feasibility Study and, despite the difficulties of the last few months, the Elders agreed to take this strategic step forward. The study is taking place in lockdown and I will continue to put regular updates in Crossroads. Please get in touch if you have any questions or would like further details.
