New Year, new challenge?



It's January. It's 2021. It's going to be a better year than 2020, isn't it? It can't not be, really. But, what can we **do** to make it better?

In 2020 cycling, which was already my favourite pass-time, became my lifeline. When we were all told we had to stay at home, the one ray of sunlight for me was the once daily exercise exemption. I couldn't cycle to work any more, but I could cycle **before** work. And I did. For about 100 days from late March I cycled every day, usually only for half an hour, but more at the weekend. My daily 'commute' to my desk in the study next to our kitchen took me up onto Caerphilly mountain dozens of times, round Roath Park lake, or across the Taff and round Radyr. Glorious sunrises, drizzly foggy days (yes there were a few of those too!), the point was being outside, being free, having a little me-time. Through the seasons riding conditions varied but the joy of riding almost daily was undiminished, sustaining me through challenging times.

Now, I'm not for a moment suggesting that riding so much is for everyone (my family think I'm just a **little** bit mad). But I believe cycling has a huge amount to offer many more people than currently ride regularly. So do a very special group of very dedicated people in Cardiff called Pedal Power. They are a charity based in Pontcanna Fields whose mission is simply to make cycling accessible to everyone. Regardless of age, experience, gender, physical or mental health or ability/disability.

If at this point you're thinking this isn't for me, please read on.

Perhaps your bike isn't in the best of health, or has been at the back of the shed for so long

you don't really know and would rather not look...

Pedal Power's mechanics can help - rejuvenating bikes either for their current or potential future owners is one of their specialities. They also refurbish donated bikes and sell them at modest prices.

Perhaps you feel you should try replacing some of those short car journeys with a bike ride, but you haven't ridden for a few - or more - years, and dealing with traffic is daunting...

Pedal Power have a team of trainers, who are experienced in restoring and building confidence in riders of all ages. They train adults and children who have never ridden, or who just need a refresher.

Perhaps you've been challenged by the news of the climate crisis to reduce your personal carbon footprint. But there are practical obstacles to leaving the car at home...

If any of this rings true for you, please get in touch. I'm hoping we might gather some brave souls together early in the new year to start on a new cycling journey. Lockdown restrictions will limit the services Pedal Power can offer in the short term, but they are very keen to spread their unique brand of encouragement widely as soon as it's possible. They really mean it when they say their mission is improving access to cycling for **all**.

Diolch.


Sunday mornings saved. A new routine - a new normal.

Dear Friends from Beulah,

It has been over 12 years since I have moved back to France from lovely Cardiff, and a lot has changed for sure in everyone's life! The time we have spent in Cardiff with my family, playing, working and attending worship in Beulah have definitely been a golden period in my life. Fortunately, somethings have not changed: I am still in touch with Ian and Jenny whose friendship have stood the test of time! A few days ago, as we were exchanging stories and good wishes with lan, I told him that I am currently helping my neighbour and friend Peter Murfitt with a recent project of his: Peter has written a book, which he hopes will be published soon, on the historical reliability of the Gospels. The title of

Peter's upcoming book is "SOLID ROCK - Stress Testing the Gospels".
